

POSTGRADUATE DIPLOMA IN APPLIED MENTAL HEALTH AND ADDICTION COUNSELLING*

Professor Mera Penehira, Head of the School of Indigenous Graduate Studies is pleased to present The Postgraduate Diploma in Applied Mental Health and Addiction Counselling (Level 8). This is a new and innovative programme designed to support the development of the mental health workforce within whānau, hapū and iwi, and other communities and industries. It aims to support those already working in the field as well as those looking at potential career shifts into the mental health sector. Graduates will be eligible to apply for registration with the Drug and Alcohol Practitioners' Association Aotearoa (DAPAANZ).

The programme is designed to give practitioners an extensive knowledge and practice of modern mental health and addiction therapies. Integration of tikanga and āhuatanga Māori into practice enables practitioners to create their own kaupapa practice frameworks.

Dates: 5i [2021 to July 2022 (full-time)
5i [2021 to Jan 2023 (part-time)

Commitment: This course has a blended delivery with noho wānanga (face to face) supported by ewānanga (online learning) and work integrated learning.

The work integrated learning component requires that taura successfully complete a minimum of 120 hours practicing as an addictions practitioner under supervision.

Other planned learning activities include tutorials, expert panel discussions, case studies, online discussions, researching with whānau, hapū and iwi, and practice-based activities.

It is recommended that taura allocate 30 – 35 learning hours per week.
